Q: Can I buy cut up fruit (such as watermelon) or vegetables from a supermarket without a hechsher? How about at an airport lounge, office party, catered event or convenience store?

A: It depends.....

 **From a supermarket**, it is acceptable, assuming it is fruit only and the fruits are the varieties that do not require special checking or washing to remove insects. This is because the market would likely have dedicated utensils and is preparing large quantities of fruit.



However, **one should not utilize these items from a caterer, convenience store or similar setting**, where it is quite likely that the fruit was cut with a non-kosher knife which we assume carries residual non-kosher.

Can I leave my Kosher lunch in a communal refrigerator, such as in an office or hospital?

1. **Packaged:** Packaged food, which would be evident if it was tampered with, may be left in a communal (or shared) area.
2. **Homemade:** Unsealed food such as a sandwich brought from home, can be left in a communal space if we can factor in the fear of getting 'caught in the act'. This is achieved by either:
 - **Yotzei V'nichnas:** If the non-Jew(s) are not informed when the owner will be back, and the owner (or a competent fill-in) returns periodically during the day.
 - **Short Time:** If the non-Jews are aware that the owner is leaving, but will be gone for less than 18 minutes, it is permissible. Usually in an office setting or hospital, it is possible the owner will return to the refrigerator at any time, thereby fulfilling this requirement. If, however, the office employees know that you will not return for the duration of the morning (such as due to a meeting or training), this would not suffice.
3. **Seal:** In the absence of the previously mentioned safeguards, Scroll K recommends that you seal your kosher food before placing it in the fridge. What qualifies as a 'seal'?
 - **Tamper-proof:** A seal must be one that will break when accessing the food. This discourages anyone other than the intended recipient from opening it, as it would necessitate him or her to create (i.e. forge) a new seal. Although it may be physically possible to forge the seal, since it would be bothersome to do so, we assume that the intact seal is the original one.
 - **How many seals?** Shulchan Aruch rules that for food which would entail a possible consumption of Biblical prohibition if switched, a double seal is required. This would require the switcher to forge two seals and adds another layer to this deterrent. If the switch would entail only a Rabbinic prohibition, only one seal is required. Thus, meat, poultry or fish require a double seal. Cheese or bread require only one.
4. **What if I forgot to seal my food, or don't have the means to seal it? Am I stuck?**
 - If you cannot seal the food and it is necessary to have your food refrigerated, you may leave it in the fridge provided that the food, when retrieved, is recognizably the same as what was left in the refrigerator.
 - There may be other reasons to permit the food if it was left unsealed; consult your Rabbi.
