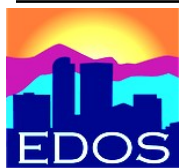

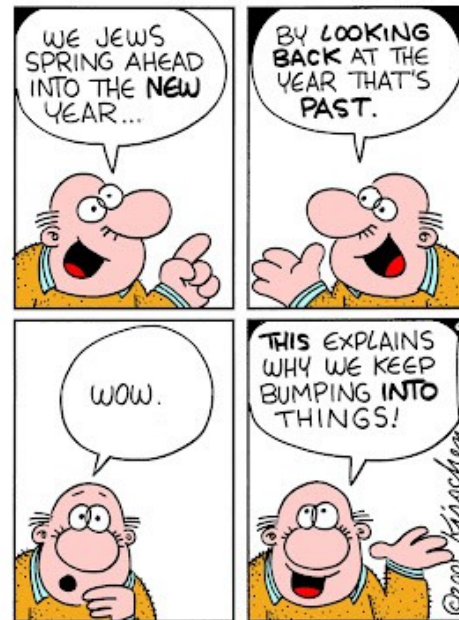

Does Sushi-grade salmon require Bishul Yisroel?

Halacha Sources:

1. Shulchan Aruch (Y.D. 113) discusses the prohibition, instituted by Our Sages against eating certain foods cooked without Jewish participation in the cooking process. This requirement is known as Bishul Yisroel.
2. There are two primary areas of exception to the Bishul Yisroel requirement: foods that are consumed in their raw state ('ne'echal chai') and foods which are not fit for kings' tables ('eino oleh al shulchan melachim'). Cooked carrots, for example, do not require Bishul Yisroel because they are eaten in their raw state as well.

Practical Applications:

Some have questioned whether the widespread societal practice of consuming certain varieties of raw fish, in the form of sushi or sashimi, would classify sushi-grade or sashimi-grade fish as 'ne'echal chai'. Nevertheless, **Scroll K policy requires all cooked salmon, tuna, and most other fish to be prepared with Bishul Yisroel.** This ruling is based primarily on the following considerations:

- 1) In order to classify a food as ne'echal chai (and thereby exempt from the requirements of Bishul Yisroel), it must be customary for most of the population in a particular region to consume it raw. Although the consumption of raw sushi-grade fish has become increasingly widespread, it is not clear that raw sushi-grade fish consumption has reached the level at which it constitutes the predominant practice among the population.
- 2) The concept of 'ne'echal chai' only applies where that food is the primary food being eaten in the raw state. Raw fish in sushi, however, is only eaten together with rice, vegetables and other ingredients. The fish is not the primary part of this dish; it is eaten in the form of a composite dish with other ingredients of interest eaten along with it. Furthermore, it is often not even most of the sushi.
